

September 1971 was the dawn of awakening for an unaware and discriminating public . . . and the beginning of a new barrier-free existence of equality for hundreds of thousands of handicapped individuals.

In that year, an organization was established that would exist to bring back into the mainstream of society a group of people who have been totally and systematically excluded; an organization that would affirm that impaired mobility and intelligence are not mutually exclusive; an organization that would highlight the fact that the only difference between a wheelchair person and an able-bodied person is the wheelchair.

Miss Wheelchair America was born.

A Columbus, Ohio physiatrist who had devoted his career to the treatment and rehabilitation of the functionally impaired individual was well aware of the capabilities, determination, talent and courage of the handicapped. This physician established Miss Wheelchair America as a forum for the promotion of the achievements as well as the needs of the handicapped. The non-profit program is coordinated by volunteers who are dedicated to increasing public awareness so that the disabled will be able to lead productive and meaningful lives.

Though based on the Miss America Pageant, the Miss Wheelchair America Pageant is in no way a beauty contest. It is, instead, a competition to select the most accomplished and articulate spokesperson for more than 14 million disabled Americans. The selected representative must be able to communicate both the needs and accomplishments of her constituency to the general public, the business community and the legislature. She is charged with a continuing effort to educate the public regarding the dignity, productiveness and basic value of the handicapped. She assumes responsibility for the ongoing effort to eliminate the architectural and attitudinal barriers that prevent the disabled from assuming their rightful place in society.

As Miss Wheelchair America, her duties are numerous and include attending the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped and attending the National Wheelchair Games. Past winners have included among their accomplishments serving as executive chairperson of the National Rehabilitation Association, serving as a member of the Governor's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped and serving as secretary of the Governor's Commission for the White House Council on the Handicapped Individual. Each year she travels widely, visiting advocacy groups, making public appearances and conducting television, radio and print interviews in the fulfillment of her major responsibilities. These include promoting awareness of the needs of the disabled, creating an awareness of the need to eliminate architectural and attitudinal barriers, informing the able-bodied public of the achievements of the physically disabled and promoting Miss Wheelchair America, Inc. by assisting in the establishment of pageant committees in all states.

In order to successfully carry out her duties and responsibilities, the individual chosen to be Miss Wheelchair America must be intelligent, self-confident, highly motivated, poised and articulate. Judging for the event is performed by a panel of professionals who base their decisions on criteria established by the national committee.

The criteria are divided into three separate categories, the most important of which is Personal Accomplishment. Forty percent of each contestant's final score comes from this category. Considerations for Personal Accomplishment include education after the onset of disability, professional position or goal and adjustment to disability.

Thirty percent of each contestant's score is in the category of Personality which deals with conversational ability, self-expression and social confidence. A final thirty percent comes from the category of Appearance which includes personal appearance as well as poise.

Judging takes place over the entire four-day event. Each contestant takes part in a series of interviews and workshops during which they are judged for their accomplishments and their participation according to the criteria.

Prior to pageant night, the judges tally the scores collected over the first three days and choose ten semi-finalists, from which five finalists are chosen to compete during a question and answer session during the pageant. On the basis of these answers, the judges choose the new Miss Wheelchair America. Both her award as well as the awards for Miss Congeniality and Miss Achievement are then presented to the winners.

"My life really began seventeen years ago, when I became disabled because of complications following major surgery. Before, I was just a housewife trying to raise two kids. Shortly after the surgery, my marriage ended in divorce. Once I became disabled and saw the problems facing the disabled, I became involved. I did not want my children to feel that I was a drain on them and that they would have to be committed to me because I was disabled. The only way I could show them that I could get along by myself was to get involved helping other people.

"I love my job and look forward to it every day. Part of my job is to get handicapped people in touch with a variety of agencies for help; we provide contacts for transportation, informational support, and countless other services. When you see a man come out of a nursing home after twenty-five years, get accessible housing, go to college, and get a good-paying job, you know your job is satisfying. Helping handicapped people to become productive citizens should be a national goal. The public is saying we can't afford it, but they don't figure the tax dollars paid out for support of the handicapped.

"People tend to visualize the handicapped as a freak of nature and not capable of doing certain things. What we want to get across is that our wheelchairs are our legs. Except for the wheelchair, we're the same as everyone else. Our brains are not on wheels. We might be mobility impaired, but our other functions are the same as theirs. We work, we marry, and we have children.

"The biggest barriers to the handicapped are not stairs or narrow doorways. It's attitudes. You have to convince people that although we have different needs, we're still the same. Once we overcome that, the physical barriers will be broken down."

Mrs. Thomson has worked for nine years as a handicapped services specialist for the Boston Housing Authority, finding suitable housing for disabled persons and guiding them to appropriate social agencies for assistance. She is the mother of two children—Karl, 24, who is a senior at Ohio State University and Pattie, 19, who is a sophomore at Brandeis University. As a full-blooded Choctaw Indian, Mrs. Thomson is the first minority person to hold the Miss Wheelchair America title.

She is serving her fourth term as president of Action for Boston Community Development and is president of the Massachusetts Association of Paraplegics. She is a member of the board and executive committee of the National Spinal Cord Injury Foundation and is a gubernatorial appointee on the State Architectural Barriers Board and the Massachusetts Rehabilitation Commission Advisory Board. President Jimmy Carter nominated her to the National Institute of Building Sciences. Mrs. Thomson participated in the President's Committee on Employment of the Handicapped, has received numerous service awards, and is active in many local and national organizations for the disabled.






Donna Natalie Wilkes MISS WHEELCHAIR DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA


Ora Janet Rhodes MISS WHEELCHAIR ARKANSAS

Laura G. Taylor MISS WHEELCHAIR NEVADA



Elizabeth Mendez MISS WHEELCHAIR PUERTO RICO



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Bonnie B. Crawford MISS WHEELCHAIR NORTH CAROLINA


