The History of Ms. Wheelchair America, Inc.

In 1972 Dr. Philip K. Wood of Columbus, Ohio had devoted his career to treating and rehabilitating persons with functional impairments. During his practice he became aware of the talents, capabilities, determination, and courage of people with disabilities. As a result, he established Ms. Wheelchair America as a forum for promoting the achievements and accomplishments of women who utilize wheelchairs for mobility, as well as the needs of all persons with mobility challenges.

The mission of Ms. Wheelchair America is to provide an opportunity of achievement for women who happen to be wheelchair users to successfully educate and advocate for the more than 64 million Americans living with disabilities. The Ms. Wheelchair America Program is in no way a traditional beauty contest.

Purpose and Goals of the Organization

Each year the Ms. Wheelchair America Organization holds a competition to select an accomplished, articulate spokeswoman for people with disabilities. The national titleholder must be able to communicate and educate the public, business community, and lawmakers regarding the dignity, productiveness, and basic value of people with disabilities. Ms. Wheelchair America continues to eliminate the architectural and attitudinal barriers that prevent people with disabilities from assuming their rightful place in society, which promotes inclusion.

Ms. Wheelchair America has numerous duties. During her reign she travels visiting advocacy groups, makes public appearances, and conducts interviews. Ms. Wheelchair America promotes her chosen platform in a variety of settings with a wide range of individuals. She serves as a positive role model for the next generation of Americans with disabilities, inspiring them to have an impact and leave a positive legacy. Her commitment and personal example serve to further the mission of Ms. Wheelchair America.

This competition gathers advocates from across America to participate in a variety of activities, which develop stronger advocates to impact people in their state. These activities allow a panel of judges to spend time with each state titleholder, while allowing the competitors time together to share with each other and develop strong bonds of friendships and sisterhood. They become stronger advocates while attending a variety of interesting workshops that strengthen them. The workshops build leadership skills, heighten awareness on the issues that exist within the community and are designed to open a dialogue between the women about their thoughts, ideas, values, and experiences.

Ms. Wheelchair America, a 501(c)3 non-profit organization, is staffed and coordinated solely by volunteers from many different community organizations, businesses, private citizens, and previous titleholders. It is through the monetary and in-kind support of several sponsors that the national titleholder can fulfill her duties throughout the year and travel across the country with her message of empowerment for people with disabilities. The Ms. Wheelchair America Program is actively seeking volunteers and sponsors. All support is appreciated.

Farewell from Ms. Wheelchair America 2022 Christine Burke

Wow, I cannot believe that the time has almost come to crown a new queen. It will be a bittersweet moment as this has become such an integral



part of my identity that's gotten me through some tough times. While my state reign may have begun on February 28th of 2020 when I was crowned by the former Ms. Wheelchair America 2016, Alette Coble-Temple, while being cheered on by Leslie Noel Hansen and the rest of my PPF Family (extending an extra year with the effects of the pandemic), my journey was already in motion in 2019. The Peter

Pan Foundation (PPF, founded by the aforementioned Leslie Noel) is a performing nonprofit foundation that creates magic for all kinds of



audiences; whether it's their annual Wish Upon A Star Disney spectacular benefiting Children's Hospital in Oakland, CA, fulfilling Make-A-Wish appearances as a child's favorite Disney character, or singing a selection of songs at local events. It was at the latter when PPF was invited to sing at the Ms. Wheelchair California 2019 competition and was invited to sing, that I could start to see how my two passions, performance and advocacy, could come together. The rest of course is history, yet I still revel in how far my path has taken me.

As MWCA 2020, I ruled on the basis of helping change how disabled people were portrayed in the media. This was my focus all throughout college and the connections I've been fortunate to make in the industry, lent me a unique position in which I could affect some small change. To this end, I was able to give talks to theater camps, Diversity, Equity and Inclusion Boards, give interviews to my local publications, and even be on podcasts with amazing humans like Jennifer Keelan-Chaffins. When I was preparing for Nationals, I decided to adjust my platform slightly to a mantra that I firmly believed in: "Putting Disability Back in Diversity." This came about after enduring

meeting after meeting in the corporate world where departments would brag about how diverse they were; "we have women, we're ethnically diverse, we have people in the LGBTQIA+ community... GO US!" Not quite, because at the intersection of all these identities is the indiscriminate DISABILITY. I also wanted to lend my platform as an ally to all those in 3 the disability community who are multi minorities. So often many of my friends recount instances where they feel they have to choose their Black identity OR their disabled identity, as both are not openly included. I did what I could to elevate important issues my friends and fellow Queens posted on social media, shared campaigns that would bring these issues to light and try as much as I could to advocate for this underrepresented community in my own work at C Talent, where





we represented high profile Deaf and Disabled artists of all backgrounds.

One of the biggest challenges of being a

"Pandemic Queen" was that physical travel to speak with groups was suddenly, if not out of the question, exceedingly more difficult. My first event of January 2022 would have been to "Ski for Light", the hands down #1 activity that all past queens sighted as one of their favorite events of their reign. Sadly, due to limited COVID precautions and residing in an at risk household meant that my talk had to be given virtually. However, when one door closed, I found I could take an elevator to a similar floor! I'd already had practice talking with local elementary schools locally, so why not try and reach as many states as I could virtually? I got to send messages to contestants in the MW Oregon, MW South Carolina, MW Michigan and of course present at my home state competition. I was fortunate in September of 2021 to visit my very first Queen Sister Ms. Wheelchair Nevada 2020, Angelica Bazile and her beautiful family on a trip to Vegas. We discussed how our platforms aligned as she was looking to elevate



Black Disabled voices in the community and shared stories of our lives. I got to continue spreading the word and finding like minded advocates as I headed to New York City to attend the Wavy Awards, honoring underrepresented musicians, and seeing blind singer and C Talent client, Lachi,



take home some hardware. On this trip I also got to get on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange and cap the day off at the Runway of Dreams gala, watching some amazing models show off the latest in adaptive fashion and network with some of my heroes.

One of my favorite moments happened at the NY Metro Abilities Expo where ten of the East Coast's past and present queens serendipitously crossed paths on the same day. While the bond of sisterhood was palpable during the years leading up to my reign, there was nothing like being able to hug a fellow sister in person after only seeing them in their

respective Zoom boxes. Abilities Expos in General were, embarrassingly enough, new territory for me. The closest I'd been was to one in San Mateo but it didn't hold my teenage attention enough to make the annual 4 trek. It became increasingly more difficult when it moved five hours away to LA, which is such a shame because let me tell you, after that event I was HOOKED on Expos for life. Reconnecting with former college roommates and kids I coached at wheelchair sports camps, re-introducing myself to pioneer rock climber Mark Wellman, who'd spoken to my high school in 2006, and getting to meet my dance icons, the LA Rollettes were hands down some of the best moments of my life.

In the end though, it was the little moments that meant the most. Most recently, I began conversations with the local Ko'Olina Resort Group in Oahu to get the ball rolling on creating equitable beach access. Circling back to my PPF Family, this year I inadvertently was the

inspiration for fellow wheelchair user and friend Amber Clark, to audition and share the stage not only with me, but with my fellow Wheel Queen podcast host, Krystina Wray Jackson, for Wish Upon A Star. I cannot wait to head to The Rollettes Experience later this month to dance my butt off, hand out some crowns to future Queens and learn from the industry's finest advocates including Long Beach Councilwoman Mary Zendejas and none other than the Mother of the Disability movement herself, Judy Heumann. Topping off the summer by heading to Michigan where I can FINALLY get a peek into the Nationals Experience will be the cherry on top. Though my reign is ending, I will never stop fighting for our incredible community. I cannot wait to meet the newest batch of advocates who are going to change the world.

On a travel adventure in 2002, Susan was bitten by a mosquito. That bite changed her life forever. The resulting California Virus caused a year-long paralysis and slow recovery period. After months on a ventilator, a tracheotomy, and long-term therapy at Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Hospital Susan

continues to improve. She uses a scooter for mobility. With the help of her husband, daughters, extended family and friends, her life is again rich and rewarding.

In addition to her love of family and design, Susan has been blessed to be involved in volunteer opportunities. After her hospitalization, she joined the Mary Free Bed Guild, an organization formed by women in 1911 which owns the Mary Free Bed Rehabilitation Hospital to this day. Susan has cochaired the Guild Art Committee, which oversees the MFB Art Exhibition. It is a show featuring work created by artists who have a physical disability. Susan developed the Guild Kitchen at MFB hospital, served on the Architectural Oversight Committee during renovations. She served on the Guild advisory committee developing the hospital kitchen which serves hospital patients and the café serving patients, family, and staff.

Susan is a past president of The Mary Free Bed Guild Fund, which supports the hospital and contributes to programs for the disabled. She is on the Board of the Mary Free Bed Guild, the Hospital Board of Trustees, and the First United Methodist Church Board of Trustees. That completed a renovation of the 150-year-old church's chancel, making it accessible and inclusive.



Dan Carmichael

Dan Carmichael is a writer, comedian, and co-owner of GT Independence: an industry-leading Financial Management Service company that helps people with long-term care needs self-direct care in their homes and communities. Through GT, Dan has started the #fairplayforall initiative, a program that provides funding and supports for advocates of inclusive playgrounds.

More on the Judging Process

Each state titleholder will receive a score in four different areas from each judge on the judging panel. The areas being scored are the titleholder application, an essay written by the titleholder, both a 10-minute and 15-minute interview with the panel of judges, and a platform speech. In addition, the top five finalists named during Saturday's Crowning Gala will be asked to answer two questions in front of the audience. The answers to those questions will also be scored. All these scores are combined. The titleholder with the highest overall score after all the judging sessions are complete will become *M*s. Wheelchair America 2023.



2023 Competition Awards

Ms. Wheelchair America 2023 is chosen by the judging panel. The contestant that earns the highest total score during the judging sessions will become Ms. Wheelchair America 2023.

The Lifetime Achievement Award is chosen by the judges and given to the contestant that they believe has made the largest contribution and significant impact for people with disabilities.

The Nicki Ard Achievement Award recipient is chosen by the judges and awarded to the woman who exemplifies the philosophy of Nicki Ard, which is to "always exhibit a positive attitude and be willing to serve others." The contestant receiving this award will have made an outstanding contribution to the disability community through her talents, her efforts, and her example.

The Outstanding Speech Award is chosen by those in attendance on speech night for the contestant that they feel delivered the most memorable speech of the evening.

The People's Choice Award is presented to the contestant who receives the most votes. Votes cost \$1.00 each and can be purchased in the weeks leading up to the National Competition until August 20, 2022. This year, forty percent of the funds raised will be distributed to the award recipient's Ms. Wheelchair State Program while the remaining funds will go to the Ms. Wheelchair America Personal Care Attendant Fund.

The Congeniality Award is chosen by the contestants. Each contestant cast one vote for the person that they feel was kindest, friendliest, most helpful, and caring throughout the week.

The Hope and Freedom Award is chosen by the Mary Free Bed Guild and awarded the contestant who demonstrates hope and positivity in their life, advocacy and a commitment to our mission of hope and freedom for all those living with a disability.

The Judy Hoit Legacy Award is given in memory of former Ms. Wheelchair America Executive Board Member and Iowa State Coordinator Judy Hoit. Judy devoted over 20 years of her life to serving the disability community and the Ms. Wheelchair America Organization. Her contributions and impact on those around her were extraordinary. The Judy Hoit Legacy Award will be given to an individual who has made a significant impact within the Ms. Wheelchair America Organization while displaying humility, selflessness, and perseverance.

The awards will be present to the chosen recipients on Saturday, August 20. 2022 during the Ms. Wheelchair America crowning gala.

Our Mission

Enter a State Competition

Many states have programs that are part of the Ms. Wheelchair America, Inc. organization. The state program is a competition to select the most articulate, accomplished delegate who will serve as a role model and spokeswoman for people with disabilities in their state.

Serve as the titleholder: This woman of achievement will have the opportunity to travel throughout their state educating the general public, business community, legislature, and others about the issues that are of importance to people with disabilities. She will share her chosen platform (or passion) with different groups, interact with the media, and serve as a role model for youth and adults alike. She will also serve as an advocate in the disability community. Her overall message will be one of promoting diversity and breaking down stereotypes against people with disabilities. Her reign will lead to an opportunity to attend the national competition where she will compete for the title of Ms. Wheelchair America.

Become an Independent Delegate

What is an Independent Delegate?

An Independent Delegate is a woman who uses a wheelchair for mobility that creates a Ms. Wheelchair Program in their state by becoming a titleholder and then serving as the State Coordinator.

Serve as the titleholder:

As an Independent Delegate you will have the opportunity to advocate for the need to eliminate architectural and attitudinal barriers that people with disabilities face by becoming a state titleholder for one year. You will serve as a role model for all people with disabilities and have the opportunity to develop a platform that you have passion for to raise awareness for all people with disabilities. This is done by meeting with elected officials, attending and speaking at advocacy events in your community and state. The goal is to promote inclusion for people with disabilities; by visitng expos, schools, universities, hospitals, support groups, civic clubs, and centers for independent living to discuss disability and sharing your experiences as a person with a disability.

Become a State Coordinator:

After you compete in the National Competition as a titleholder. You serve as the State Coordinator, build the program in your state, and hold an annual state event to crown a new titleholder every year.
